- ✓ All Entries must contain **pumpkin** as an ingredient with the exception of the decorated cakes and cookies
- ✓ All entries must be edible
- ✓ No entry requiring electricity or heating is allowed
- ✓ Include an index card with your name & phone number on one side and the recipe on the other
- ✓ Entries must be brought to the Old School in Mishicot located at 315 Elizabeth Street between 9-10 am
- ✓ Winners will be posted and announced around 1 pm
- ✓ Entries may be picked up after 2:00 pm
- ✓ Entries will be judged on overall appearance, presentation, originality and taste at the discretion of the judges

- ✓ Pumpkin Entries may be picked up after 2 pm

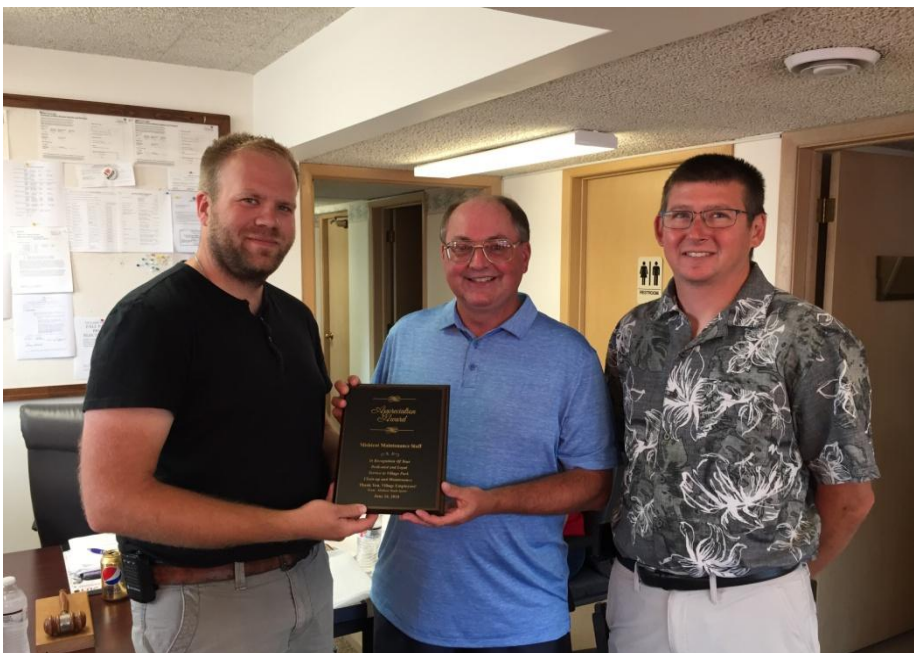

MISHICOT Post Office Offers Tips On Dog Bite Prevention

Advises on how to avoid being bitten and be a responsible dog owner

Mishicot, WI — A dog might be a man's best friend, but is it a letter carrier's? With summer still in season, the warm weather invites situations when a dog can be potentially dangerous, and in recent weeks, local letter carriers have been bitten by dogs.

"That's why we need to deliver an important message about dog bite prevention," said Mishicot Postmaster Kristie Kalies. "Several of our letter carriers know first-hand about the prevention and the pain of animal attacks, and we want to help educate the community — especially parents and pet owners."

More than 4.5 million people are bitten annually by dogs. Last year, nearly 5,000 letter carriers were bitten by dogs across the country. At the Mishicot Post Office, there have been more than 10 dog incidents within the last year. These numbers pale in comparison to the more than 2 million children who received dog bite injuries in a single year.

The American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA) and the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) report that small children, the elderly, and letter carriers, in that order, are the most frequent victims of dog bites. Children are the majority of victims and are 900 times more likely to be bitten than letter carriers.

"Dog attacks are the most commonly reported childhood public health problem in the United States," adds Kalies. "Dog bite victims account for up to 5 percent of emergency room visits."

The following tips will help people avoid being bitten by a dog and offer advice on how to be a responsible dog owner.

How to Avoid Being Bitten

- Don't run past a dog. The dog's natural instinct is to chase and catch you. If a dog threatens you, don't scream. Avoid eye contact. Try to remain motionless until the dog leaves, and then back away slowly until the dog is out of sight.
- Don't approach a strange dog, especially one that's tethered or confined.
- While letter carriers are discouraged from petting animals, people who choose to pet dogs should always let a dog see and sniff them before petting the animal.
- If you believe a dog is about to attack you, try to place something between yourself and the dog, such as a backpack or a bicycle.

How to Be a Responsible Dog Owner

- Obedience training can teach dogs proper behavior and help owners control their dog in any situation.
- When the letter carrier comes to your home, keep your dog inside, away from the door, in another room, or on a leash.
- Dogs can be protective of their territory and may interpret the actions of letter carriers as a threat.
- Please take precautions when accepting mail in the presence of your pet.
- Spay or neuter your dog. Neutered dogs are less likely to bite. Humane Society of the United States (HSUS) statistics reflect that dogs that have not been spayed or neutered are up to three times more likely to be involved in a biting incident than neutered or spayed dogs.
- Dogs that haven't been properly socialized, receive little attention or handling, or are left tied up for long periods of time frequently turn into biters.

Mishicot Historical Museum and Research Center News

- ❖ **LOCATION FOR STATE HISTORICAL MARKER:** As plans proceed for application for a State of Wisconsin Historical Marker honoring our namesake, Old Chief Mishicot, popular opinion has been sought regarding location of the marker. The preferred location is on Main Street, along Cemetery Hill, east of the large flower bed. Last October 1, 2017, we submitted a 30-page application for a State of Wisconsin Historical Marker. Since then, we, including Robert Fay, an approved state adviser from Two Rivers, have heard from the state eight (8) times with need for clarification and changes to our proposal. The last clarification was sent on August 8, 2018 and is included in this article.
- ❖ **PAINTING:** Our museum is undergoing a complete exterior painting. Be sure to check it out. There is new life in the old building, both inside and out.
- ❖ **JACQUES VIEAU GENEALOGY:** Our research center has been the recipient of a two-volume 430 page 30 year genealogy project of Susan Campbell of Hawaii. Susan is the author and was recently at our museum and gifted us with the set. She is a direct descendent of Jacques Vieau and complimented us on our museum.
- ❖ **ANDREW VIEAU MARKER:** Recently our museum and Jim Sustman were responsible for a new marker commemorating Andrew Vieau, son of Jacques Vieau. Andrew purchased 80 acres of the Black Earth Potawatomi Village located on Norman Rd, Kewaunee County, so Chief Mishicott and his tribe could remain in the area. The Zabel Monuments and the Cawley Company, both of Manitowoc donated the materials and expertise to make the monument possible. It is located in section FF in the Allouez Cemetery. We are grateful to both the Zabel Monuments and the Cawley Company.
- ❖ **CHIEF MISHICOT PRESENTATION:** Again this year during PumpkinFest, there will be presentations on the Chief Mishicott Story. Again this year it will be in the "Old School" across from the museum at 10:30am and again at 1:30pm. These presentations are free. Plan to attend.
- ❖ **SPIRIT OF THE RIVERS' HONORED SPEAKERS:** Our village and our museum were recently honored with the presence of both Ken Meshigaud, the Hannahville Indian community leader, and his brother, Earl Meshigaud, Cultural Leader, who were speakers at the dedication of this beautiful and important monument. Both Ken and Earl, who are brothers, are direct descendants of Chief Mishicott, the namesake of our village, township and river.

What DO YOU Know About MISS-SHE-COT????

Some little known facts about our village –

- That the first Manitowoc superintendent of Schools was from Mishicot!
- That one of the founders of Dole Pineapple was the grandson of Mishicot founder Daniel Smith.
- That Mishicot once had more businesses than Manitowoc.
- That the covered bridge built c1868 but not covered until 1995.
- That Mishicot had a hospital built in 1905.
- That Mishicot village, township and river were all named after an important Potawatomie chief.
- That Mishicot produced its own electricity from its dam in 1910.
- That Mishicot had a tragic double murder on Main Street in 1894.
- That Mishicot had a runner in the 1984 U.S. Olympics.
- That Rockway Street was named by the founder for his first grandson and that Elizabeth Street was named for his wife.
- That the Indian word Mishicot literally means feather leggings of an Owl worn in dancing.
- That the village was given permission by the Hannahville Tribe for use of its logo in 2005 and is probably the only place in Wisconsin that has such permission.
- That the first woman county superintendent of schools was from Mishicot.

- That our Historical Museum plans a yearly historical bus trip to the land of Chief Mishicot in June.
- That the cemetery began in 1844 when the founder, Daniel Smith's daughter, died and was buried on the hill overlooking the mill and river.
- That Mishicot had its own baseball team called the "Brewers".
- Chief Mishicot's great-grandson led our Pumpkinfest Parade in 2005.
- Dr. Karnopp built this house for a hospital.
- In 1844, was the first burial in the cemetery for founder's daughter.
- Lillian Chloupek was the first woman superintendent in the county.
- Cindy Bremser took 4th place in the 1984 U.S. Olympics.
- Our dam provided the village with electricity in 1910.
- Tragedy hits the village in 1894.
- Mishicot had a connection to Pearl Harbor.
- The villages called the founder, Daniel Smith, "Uncle Dan".
- The Holst Bros. Store was a total department store that served the village for 78 years.

Donation Received

The Mishicot High School Students will be benefitting from a richer manufacturing education thanks to a \$105,690.00 donation presented to the School district in August. The donation, provided by D&S Machine Services of Luxemburg, will take the form of new shop equipment, including lathes and a milling machine. Equipment will be received during the first semester of the 2018 upcoming school year.

Mishicot High School was recently recognized by the Wisconsin RtI Center (Response to Intervention) for Mathematics and Reading at the gold level. The recognition noted the district's work toward fully implementing a school-wide framework that leads to improved student outcomes. Mishicot is the only high school to earn gold recognition.

The picture below is the design for Mishicot's first mural that Mishicot Historical Museum and Research Center and Mishicot Area Growth and Improvement Committee (M.A.G.I.C.) are working on to get placed on the East side of Pathways Photography building on Main Street in downtown Mishicot (pictured below). Hopefully by spring of 2018, the Mural will be completed.

For the last several months, Dale Knaaf, mural artist, along with representatives of Silver Lake College Art Department and the committee, have developed this design. It will be painted on metal panels that will be attached to the side of the old bank building, now Pathways Photography. A massive sculpture has appeared on the Lake Michigan shoreline between Manitowoc and Two Rivers. Spirit of the Rivers, a tribute to the Woodland Indians of the Upper Great Lakes, consists of three 10-foot-high human figures and a 20-foot birch bark canoe in bronze. Created by sculptor R.T. “Skip” Wallen, the sculpture was dedicated on September 16, 2018 at 4815 Memorial Drive, Two Rivers. The speaker at the dedication was Ken Meshigaud, leader of the Hannahville Potawatomi and great-grandson of Chief Mishicott, the namesake for the Village of Mishicot.

The sculpture is expected to become a major tourist attraction. The monumental bronze group portrays a young Native American man portaging a canoe with his female companion beside him and an Elder welcoming them ashore. The sculpture celebrates the origins and long history of human settlement along these shores.

Fall Election Information

The Fall General Election is fast approaching. Now is the perfect time to make sure you are properly registered. There is a new fast, easy online service eligible voters can use to register, request an absentee ballot, update their name or address, or even to look up their voter history or to check on the status of an absentee ballot request. The online service is available at <https://MyVote.wi.gov>

IMPORTANT TIP FOR THOSE ELECTION MAILINGS URGING YOU TO REGISTER OR ABSENTEE VOTE: Read directions on those mailings carefully. You will need to provide proof of residency with a registration form, and you will in most cases need to provide a photo ID with a request for absentee ballot. MyVote.wi.gov will almost always be easier to use than the election mailings you receive.

REGISTRATION

All voters must be registered to vote in the State of Wisconsin. Here are some helpful guidelines:

- You may register in person in the clerk's office up until 5:00 p.m. on the Friday before the election.
Office Hours: MWF 9-noon and 1-5; Tue/Thur 9-noon
- You may register by mail up to 20 days before the election (October 17th).
- You may register on line up to 20 days prior to the election (October 17th) via <https://MyVote.wi.gov>
- Proof of residency is required to register.
- You must have lived in the village at least 10 days prior to an election.

If you do not have proof of residency, please contact your municipal clerk as soon as possible. Using the US Mail Service, we can help you obtain proof of residency right from our office, free of charge.

PHOTO ID

State law requires that all residents show photo ID prior to voting every time they vote. If you do not have a photo ID, the Wisconsin Department of Transportation provides State ID cards free of charge for voting. Learn about getting a free Wisconsin ID card, even if you do not have a birth certificate, on the WI Dept. of Transportation website: <http://www.dot.wisconsin.gov/drivers/drivers/apply/idcard.htm>

ABSENTEE VOTING

- You must be registered to receive an absentee ballot.
- You may request an absentee ballot in person in the clerk's office until 5:00 p.m. the Friday before the election.
- You may request a ballot by mail, fax or on line until 5:00 p.m. Thursday prior to the election.
- You may use <https://MyVote.wi.gov> to request an absentee ballot.
- In most cases, a copy of your photo ID is required.

In-person absentee voting is available in the clerk's office as soon as the ballots arrive from the county, about September 19 for the November election, and are then available for voting during regular office hours. All absentee ballots should be returned to the clerk for delivery to the polls by 8:00 p.m. on Election Day in order to be counted.
